SPONSORSHIP PROGRAM

KHW-India's Sponsorship Program has so far helped hundreds of children from various backgrounds and communities, irrespective of caste, religion and ethnicity, to fulfill their dreams and reach their goal in life, which could otherwise have not been fulfilled due to their poor economic status and inability of the parents to educate them. It has been a joy to support these children and to see them grow and develop into happy productive individuals.

Presently there are almost 400 children under the sponsorship program. The common criterion that enables a child to come under this program is their economic status and the inability of the parents to educate their child due to poverty or other social problems. KHW lays a strong emphasis on quality education and motivates children to remain focused on their studies, as a good education is the first stepping-stone to achieve success.

Under this program, a child is connected with an individual, group or corporate, who regularly support the child for his/her studies or training preferably till such time as they are able to become financially independent. KHW also lays a very strong emphasis on Child Wellbeing and Child Protection and strictly follows its Child Protection Policy.

A majority of the sponsored children attend KHW-India's school, Dehradun Public School, Village Kandoli, Dehradun. Having our own school helps as siblings of sponsored children can also attend.

During the past year, KHW India's sponsorship program is being supported by Kinderhilfswerk Global Care - Germany, Kinderhulpwerk – Nederland, CHILD's Trust - UK, Sevenska Missionskyrkan-Sweden, Waterstone-USA & Wee Care-Singapore.

Impact of Sponsorship Program on the life of Angel Dyson...



Angel's father Neeraj was working as a driver, driving a private car. In 2015, he developed a small wound on his left foot. The doctors told him that his nerve from the small left toe is blocked and he will need an operation, which will cost approximately 2/2.5 lakhs otherwise they will have to cut his foot. Angel's mother sought help from different sources to try and get the operation done. She managed to collect about Rs.70,000 from family, friends and church. She requested the doctors to start the operation and she would definitely try and pay the

amount after the operation is complete. But the doctors at the hospital refused to do so, saying that the entire amount should first be deposited only then they would operate. In the meantime, the foot started turning black and Neeraj was in much pain. Angel's mother took him to different hospitals to try and get the treatment done but to no avail. Finally, she brought him to Jolly Grant Hospital at Rishikesh, where the doctors had to cut his left foot. However, post operation, the doctors found that Gangrene had spread in his left leg and had come up to the knee. There was no other option left except to cut his leg from the knee. He now lives with this disability and is unable to do any job. Angel was studying in class 2 at that time and because of the husband's sickness, attention could not be given to her studies and she became weak in her studies. She is trying very hard to improve. Angel's mother is also unable to work as she is taking care of two children along with her husband. Financially they do not have any regular source of income and her mother and mother-in-law help them with rations and other necessities. Angel's fee at the school is also due as her mother has not been able to pay the same.

Angel is a sweet girl and is very active. She loves to go to school. She loves to draw, paint, and dance. Her dream is to either become an IPS officer or an Airhostess, when she grows up.

Impact of the Sponsorship Program on the life of Roopali Negi

Roopali has been sponsored by KHW since the beginning when she began her studies in Pre-Nursery. Even though, she had to change schools in between, most of her schooling has been at Dehradun Public School, where she studied from Class 4 to 9. She says that those have the best years of her life and no other school can be compared to DPS, where the teachers were compassionate, helpful and caring. Roopali has completed her schooling and is now pursuing Bachelors program in Business



Administration (BBA) from Mahadevi Institute of Technology, which is a 3-year course. Once she completes this, she would like to get into the Banking sector and work in a bank.

Roopali comes from a very poor family. She lives with her parents and two brothers. Her elder brother has Cerebral Palsy and is totally confined to his wheel chair. Her younger brother studies in Class 9 at New Life Centre school. Roopali's mother stays at home as she has to take care of the elder son. Her father works as a cook at the Sharp Memorial School for the Blind. He does not earn enough income in order to take care of the family needs as well as pay for the education of his children. Along with his family needs, he also has to take care of his brother's family, who has lost his wife and has two children. He does not have a regular job and one of his sons is also a differently abled child. Roopali's grandmother also lives with them. It has been extremely difficult for them to survive on a daily basis.

Roopali is extremely thankful to KHW for the help rendered to her and her family due to which she has been able to receive good education and her brother has been able to receive physiotherapy. She says that her family situation has been so difficult that if KHW had not come forward to help them in their need, nothing would have been possible. She is working hard and hopes to get a good job after completing her studies so that she can share the financial burden of the family with her father.

SHIFA

Shifa began in 2008 in a small rented room with only 8 to 10 children, but as of today it is an oasis of joy and safety for 148 beautiful children, who come from economically and socially challenged situations. KHW supports 115 children in the school through generous financial assistance from Uniting Church in Sweden, Waterstone-USA & Wee Care-Singapore.

Most school children come from rag-picker families. Others are school dropouts, caught up in the mire of migration, poverty, family abuse, lack of parental support, and dysfunctional families. When Shifa found them, they were unschooled even in the most basic of education and unfit for the formal school system. Regardless of their age or state of education, Shifa took them in and started shaping their lives. Naturally, many of them had learning challenges, which was further compounded by years of malnutrition that began whilst they were still in their mother's womb. Patient and diligent teachers lovingly counseled them, taught them, and consoled them. Now indeed it is a privilege to witness

Iqra is a student who has been with Shifa from Kindergarten. Her mother, Irshad, too, has worked at the school as a cook for the last seven years.

Iqra is a very bright student and stood first in her class last year. This year she secured admission at a good school in the city as a grade 8 student. This school, however, is a bit far off to get to, and she cannot afford to take the bus. The smile on her face was breathtaking when Shifa gifted her with a bicycle! She now cycles to school everyday!!



BUNKAR

From November 2016, KHW, in partnership with Joy Corps, USA has been helping the children of artisans working at JOYN, a social enterprise creating jobs for the underprivileged especially women. Most of the workers come from poor families, having lived on the street or struggled with substance abuse or disability.

JoyCorps supports development programs that move the community toward long-term sustainability by promoting wholeness in six categories: occupational, physical, intellectual, emotional, spiritual, and social. The goal is not to give a temporary handout, but to move the community toward real transformation and the local businesses toward long-term sustainability.

The main activities under the Bunkar program are:

- Education Program for the children of artisans
- Onsite Artisan's Childcare Program (Creche)
- NIOS tutoring for artisans who wish to continue education
- Care for Special Needs children
- Higher education and or training for artisans



All the students have done really well in their term exams and have made their parents really proud. They have all been promoted to higher classes and are working really hard to learn a lot and get good grades to move forward. Last year one of our 12th graders finished school and is currently researching what is the best college and course for her to start pursuing.

Story of Ashish (Vikram Singh)

5 years ago, my dad left his job as a carpenter, and we moved from Pauri Garhwal to Dehradun. I was almost done with high school and was looking forward to studying Agriculture at college. Unfortunately, the costs were too high for us to afford. My parents were doing all they could to help me achieve my dream. Despite my family's best efforts, we were not able to come up

with the funds. That's when my dad approached JoyCorps. JoyCorps decided to help us by providing 70% of the fees. It's been two years now since I have begun my college. I am very happy and grateful." - Ashish Kumar



DEHRADUN PUBLIC SCHOOL

Dehradun Public School continues to impart holistic education to children from lower and middle income groups. The school is an initiative of Kinderhilfswerk Society and was set up with an aim to provide quality education with an overall development of children regardless of their social, economic or cultural backgrounds, encouraging them to discover and utilize their God-given potential to the utmost for their emotional, social, physical and professional growth.

This year there are 337 children, with 147 girls and 190 boys. Of this, 184 children are sponsored, i.e. 90 girls and 94 boys. The school has 16 teaching staff and 18 non-teaching staff. 3 new teachers were appointed this year to replace those who left due to retirement or moving to other schools.

In this academic year, **26** students appeared for **ICSE Examinations** from both Science and Humanities Stream. School achieved **100%** pass result with **Paras Kumar** scoring 89.6%, **Arpita Anal** scoring 83.6% marks and **Bharti** scoring **82.2%** marks. All three had taken Science subjects.

The school is financially supported by parent's contributions, sponsorships from KHW Global-Care, Germany, Kinderhulpwerk-Nederland and CHILD's Trust UK, and RTE (Right to Education) grants from the government.

This year the school was able to install CCTV cameras in the school, which is not only a requirement from the Education Board and the government, but which is also very necessary for the safety and protection of children. We are extremely thankful to Kinderhilfswerk Global-Care, Germany, for generously providing funds for this.



It was a privilege for the staff and students of DPS to host the Chairman of Kinderhilfswerk Global-Care, Mr. Georg Frank and his wife, Marion, who visited the school, met with the staff and students, especially the sponsored children and interacted with them. They were overjoyed to see the progress



being made by the children, both in their studies as well as extra-curricular activities.

The school has been working towards upgrading to Classes 11 & 12 and offer students complete education in the Science, Humanities and Commerce stream. Formalities and paperwork has been completed with the Indian Council of Secondary Education Board (ICSE) and an on-site inspection by a member of the Council is awaited before permission is granted to open classes 11 & 12. We are confident to receive this approval by April 2020, when the new academic session will begin. Once this happens our children will no longer have to leave the school after Class 10, but they can continue at DPS until the higher secondary level (Class 12). The Principal, Headmistress and administrative staff along with the teachers and students are looking forward to this new step in the life of the school.

Students continue to excel in the field of academics, curricular and non-curricular activities. Their enthusiasm and motivation to come to school and learn never becomes reduced. It is a joy to see them grow and move on in life, step by step in their life journey...

CHILD SAFETY & SECURITY

Child Wellbeing & Protection is at the heart of KHW. A strong emphasis is always laid on the safety and security of children. All staff, volunteers, visitors, donors, and even the management are aware of the Child Protection Policy and have signed the document. Workshops, seminars and sessions with the teaching and non-teaching staff as well as students of DPS is conducted on a regular basis in order to create awareness on issues relating to abuse of children and their safety and protection. Regular activities are organized for the DPS students as well, such as collage and poster competitions, skits, and debates etc. with a focus on child protection issues. This is done with an endeavour to make child protection issues as a way of life for both the staff and the students so that abuse in any form can be restricted both on campus and in the community.

Since KHW has trained and certified trainers, it is also actively involved in training of staff and assisting in developing of Child Protection Policy of other organisations and schools in the Community Health Global Network – Uttarakhand Cluster, of which it is a member.

Not limiting the Child Protection Initiatives to just activities and training within the organization, KHW is also keen on including these initiatives in its Inclusive Disaster Risk Reduction program (DiDRR) program in the future by creating awareness on child abuse among Children at Risk in disaster situations as well as differently abled children.

I'm planning to complete my Internship and after that I will prepare for RRB-JE(railways recruitment control board- junior engineer) or Indian coast guard JE post as my marks are sufficient to apply for these posts.

My journey in Dehradun Public School started on April 2011 when my younger sister, Sakshi Thapli, (currently a student of class 8th) and I took admission in Dehradun Public School. After my mother passed away, my grandmother took care of my sister and myself. My 4 years in Dehradun public school refined my knowledge and self-confidence and my academics and result was also above average. I gained a keen interest in writing essay, debates and playing sports. During my last year at DPS, I planned to join naval forces or railways as an engineer. I cleared my class 10th from DPS with 76% in aggregate.

Our Director Sir, Mr. J.P. Singh helped me throughout my studies and is still helping me in my engineering studies. KHW has also supported my family like a pillar, especially my Grandmother in her medical treatment as she is a heart patient and her age is above 75 years and also my sister who is studying in class 8th in DPS. I'm very thankful to Dehradun Public school family and KHW Asia for giving me this golden opportunity to achieve success and set an example for upcoming batches that if life gives you an opportunity, then it's your duty to grab it with both your hands.

SAMVEDNA

Dimpy lives with her parents and an elder brother in a joint family along with her grandparents, uncles and aunts. Her father is a driver and drives the city bus on a daily wage basis @ Rs.400/- per day. Dimpy has an elder brother, Aditya, who is studying in Class 4 at Manav Kalyan School. Her mother is a housewife. Since her father is on daily wages, the monthly income depends on the number of days he goes to work and therefore it is irregular. He is thus unable to take care of the needs of his family as well as educate his children. Dimpy's uncles are employed but they do not contribute to the family and just take care of their own immediate family. Thus, the burden of taking care of the grandparents also falls on

Dimpy's father and mother, which includes taking care of their medication and old age related health problems. Dimpy's grandfather keeps himself occupied by taking care of a cow that they have and manage a very small shop opened in a shack to sell small items like toffees, sweets, and chocolates to the children in the slum.

Dimpy is a special needs child. She was born without a forearm on her left hand. However, this does not seem to deter her spirit, as she is an extremely bright and active child, who loves to talk. She loves dancing, coloring and playing video games. Although she is only 5 years old, she already has in mind that she wants to become a Bank Manager when she grows up.

HAMARA CENTER

(Unit of Mother Teresa Shikshan Avam Prashikshan Samiti)

Hamara Center is located in Landhaura, a rural sub-division of Roorkee, Haridwar district about 100kms south of Rajpur where KHW office is located. The center is managed by a committed and enthusiastic young man, Jonathan Singh. It serves a large, mainly poor, rural and mostly Muslim population where there is a large incidence of disability.

Although, Jonathan Singh, the founder of 'HAMARA Center', had been working with children with disability under the auspices of Mother Teresa Shikshan Avam Prashikshan Samiti since 2016, there was no place for the children to come to and the work was not proving to be effective. A need for a center was therefore felt and a year later 'HAMARA Center' was started on 3rd December 2017. At present more than 20 children with disabilities are being served in the Center. The Center was facing a lot of financial difficulties and good care for the children was being hindered. For a year, the center struggled and it was only in December 2018 that KHW came forward to partner with Hamara Center to help strengthen its capacity towards providing better facilities and care for Children with Disabilities. Jonathan is a member of the CHGN-UKC and had in the recent past supported its parnters working in disability as a special educator.

KHW has since then been supporting 15 children with their assessment, personal development program, rehabilitation, medical treatment, education and transportation.

AMJAD'S STORY

Amjad lives with his parents, a younger brother and sister in a joint family along with his grandmother, uncles and aunts. He is a loving teenager who suffers from Cerebral Palsy with mental retardation. He is 14 years old but mentally he is still a 2-year-old child. Amjad's father, Arshad, runs a small tea stall through which he is supporting his family. His mother, Maharan, is a housewife. She also does not keep too well, facing a lot of health issues. Amjad's uncles are employed but they do not contribute towards the family needs and just take care of their own immediate families. Thus, the burden of taking care of the grandmother also falls on Amjad's father and mother, which includes taking care of her medication and other age related health issues.

When Amjad was brought to 'Hamara Center', he did not have any mobility and was unable to stand. His bones were all stiff and could not move at all. He did not have any fine or gross motor skills. He was very thin and could not make any sounds, as he did not have a voice. He was drooling most of the time.

From January 2018 onwards, the teachers and staff of Hamara Center started working on his Fine and Gross motor skills and involved him in other activities as well. From the time Amjad entered the Center till now, we have seen a great change in his life. Now he can stand with support for more than 15 minutes and is able to walk with the help of walker. He is able to chew food and is also making an effort to create sounds, using some signs to communicate.

All his medical assessments, medicines and treatment are being financially supported through KHW. Amjad's family is very much happy to see his improvement and is extremely thankful to KHW for their help and support.

Recently he was taken to Herbertpur Christian Hospital in Dehradun for an assessment and he has received clippers and getters. He is absolutely delighted as he is able to stand on his own and is learning to walk slowly.

DILIP (Disability Inclusive Livelihood Initiatives Program)

KHW and the Uttarakhand Cluster of Community Global Health Network (CHGN-UkC), in partnership with Anglican Overseas Aid and the Nossal Institute, Australia, developed a pilot program of delivering livelihoods initiative for people with disabilities across their program sites. The project (Disability Inclusive Livelihoods Initiatives Program) was developed to offer livelihood opportunities to people with disabilities with a focus on encompassing a range of disabilities. This was a follow-up from Inclusive Livelihood initiatives of KHW after the 2013 disaster. The Phase I of the DILIP project began in October 2016 with 10 member organizations registering under it. The lead NGO was Herbertpur Christian Hospital. It was a two-year duration program.

Two main goals of the program were:

- Meaningful Engagement, &
- Gainful employment

In this first phase, a baseline survey was conducted with 90 Persons with disabilities, of which 43 very needy families were selected. They were engaged in Animal Husbandry, Organic Farming, Composting, poultry farming and goat rearing. The program was also a means of strengthening the CHGN partners.

Phase I successfully ended in September 2018, with a lot of learning, both for the CHGN partners as well as the beneficiaries. The students of Melbourne University conducted an evaluation and they were impressed by the outcome of this program.

After the successful completion of Phase I, it was decided to step into Phase II of the DILIP program, with Landour Community Hospital being the lead NGO and the program being partially funded by Kinderhilfswerk Society (KHW). Phase II began in April 2019 and it is a one-year duration program. In this phase, there will be 11 CHGN partners who will be involved. 40 poor PWD families have been selected for this phase. The goal and aim of the program continues to remain the same.

Two new livelihood options have been added to those initiated in the first phase. These are:

- Mushroom plantation
- Beekeeping

Another new initiative that has been taken up in this phase is developing a linkage of the PWD families with government agencies to strengthen their livelihood engagement and also to sensitize the government officials regarding the PWDs.

Impact of the DILIP Program in Arjun's life



Arjun suffers from Duchenne's Muscular Dystrophy. He is 20 years old. His father works a long distance away from his home. He lives with his mother, sister and Uncle and his family. Due to their limited understanding about disability, Arjun's family members, especially his grandmother, always considered him as "poor thing". She related his condition to sins in the past life.

Arjun spent most of his time at home, secluded socially from the society as others always laughed him at because of the way he walks. During the daytime, he collected grass and firewood for the house and the rest of the time he spent inside the house. He did not like participating in any of the social gatherings in the village.

Under the DILIP program, a PT & OT assessment was done for Arjun and he was diagnosed with Duchenne's Muscular Dystrophy. The doctor's recommended that his level of activity and movement should be limited.

During the first phase of the DILIP Program, Arjun's family was provided with some fruit yielding plants and 3 goats. The fruit trees have not yielded fruit as yet. Arjun's mother is looking after the goats. In order to involve Arjun in an economic activity, they were provided with 25 chicks last year. 5 chicks died during transportation. So they have 20 chicks remaining now. Since, the doctor's recommended limiting Arjun's physical activity, this activity is best suited for him. He goes out to feed the chicks, takes care of them and plays with them. Due to this, there is a lot of change in Arjun's life. He is so happy to be involved in this program as he says that this program 'gave me many things'. Villagers now come by and talk to him. Friends come over to see him, talk to him and he also fixes their phones for them. He is, however, still apprehensive of participating in social gatherings for fear of laughter. For his future plans, he has requested the DILIP team to help him learn stitching and handiwork activities.

JAMEEL AHMAD'S LIFE CHANGED

Jameel Ahmad comes from an underprivileged family. He earns a livelihood by selling vegetables on a roadside cart. He lives with his wife and two children in a joint family along with his brothers and their families. Jameel suffers from Diabetes. He had developed gangrene in his right leg. Unfortunately, his lower limb had to be amputated. This made it very difficult for Jameel to set up his vegetable cart daily in order to sell vegetables. His financial condition deteriorated as well since he had to spend a lot of money in the travel to and from Dehradun to Chandigarh, which is about 180 kms away. Through KHW, Jameel came to know about the **CHGN UKC Accessibility Fund** under which he could receive an artificial limb. KHW guided him in the due process and he was able to get a custom made lower limb (right leg) from Anugrah, Christian Hospital, Herbertpur (HCH).

Jameel was overjoyed when he walked out of Herbertpur Christian Hospital, with his new limb. Being able to walk without crutches has brought back his confidence and he is enthusiastically working daily.

He is extremely thankful to KHW, CHGN and HCH for their help in bringing normalcy to his life again and motivating him to work again in order to support his family.
